Best of Show, August, by Stewart Musket

I am always interested in improving the quality of my prints so when I saw that Ruth Burke, a fine art digital photographer, was offering a week-end Coastal Photo and Digital Printing Workshop in Seabrook, Texas, I made arrangements to attend. An added incentive was the opportunity to photograph water birds and other marine subjects. Seabrook, a bird sanctuary on one of the largest migratory paths in North America, is five minutes from the NASA/Johnson Space Center, 25 minutes from Houston and Galveston, and across the bridge from the Kemah Boardwalk.

On my first afternoon in Seabrook, as I faced Galveston Bay, the number of pelicans I saw was astounding! Every piece of wood rising from the surface of the water was topped by a bird. I took a number of photographs and looked forward to photographing more at sunrise. I was on location well before then, and all that could be seen was a thick gray fog and some vaguely defined dark objects. As the light increased, a number of exciting scenes combining fog, water, sunlight, and birds developed. I took several photographs until the magic of the scene faded away. I used a Canon 1D Mk II on a tripod with a 100-400mm f/4.5-5.6 lens. I photographed at 1/80 second, 200 mm, f/20 with ISO 400.

Judge's comment: "I'm just in an Aw-Aw with this image. It's very lovely. There is a gorgeous detail in the sun hitting the water going right through the image. The fact that you were able to get the sun and detail in the sun is wonderful. I also love the softness of the birds at the bottom. It's a beautiful image. A message to PPC members The Fall Fashion Outdoor Model Shoot is coming up 20 October!

My Day at the Balloon Festival by Marie Hansen

The alarm went off at 4:30 AM, and it was pitch black outside. I've never enjoyed getting up early, but this was ridiculous. Even so I looked forward to seeing the dawn balloon launch, so I dragged myself out of bed, grabbed a breakfast bar, gathered up my equipment, and off I went. I drove in from Fairview in the dark and found my way to premium parking. When I got to the meeting spot, I was disappointed that only three others had showed up (more eventually arrived.) After waiting for a while, Elizabeth Szilagyi handed out the 8 category assignments in clever sealed envelopes that she had obviously taken great care to prepare. After asking a few questions, our little group went our separate ways in search of photo ops. I had just gotten a new Nikon 18-200VR lens and was anxious to find out if it was as great as the reviews claimed.

The obvious place to start was with the balloon launch. What an awesome sight! Balloons were lifting off and drifting away every few minutes for the next hour. I never knew that balloons came in such a myriad of shapes and styles ranging from the very colorful to the whimsical. There was a tree, a cow, a daisy, a bunny, a pirate. I loved the cow and was glad that the judges picked that one for the **best balloon**. (1/500, f5.6, 80mm, ISO320.) I also captured an image of one of the more colorful balloons floating directly overhead with the burner flames shooting up into the balloon, and that picture was selected for **low angle** (1/80, f8, 40MM,





ISO400).

I watched the balloons for a while and then decided to check out the vendor area for other interesting activities. After rambling around for about an hour, I discovered an entertainment tent at the very back of the festival area where young dancers were performing. A group waiting at the side of the stage for their turn to perform caught my attention. Some girls were

talking to each other; others were watching or dancing along with their friends on stage and mouthing words to the high-energy music. You could see the excitement in their faces. They were jiggling around a lot, and they were standing in a shadowy area. I knew a fast shutter speed was called for, and I finally had to bump the ISO up to 1600 to **"shoot from**

the hip"—plus I had to zoom all the way out to capture their faces since I was standing on the other side of the tent. (1/100, f5.6, 200mm, ISO1600). This was a good trial for my new VR lens. In the photo the faces and expressions are clear and skin tones natural, although as would be expected for such a high ISO, there is a lot of noise in the black clothing that all the girls are wearing.





By this point I was tired and decided to start walking back toward my car. Along the way I spotted purple balloons tied down with silver ribbons waving above a vendor's stall. Aha, I thought what a great example of **lines**. The purple color contrasted nicely with the blue sky in the background. (1/250, f20, 170mm, ISO400.)

With that I headed back to meet up with the others at Starbucks, where it seemed to take forever to download pictures and select entries. When that was finally done, several of us went to eat at Cici's pizza and to wait for the judges to arrive with the results. Believe me no one was more surprised than I to have four winners. I've been into serious photography for only a few years, so this experience gave me a big boost in confidence.

I came back later for the evening activities. Unlike that morning, the festival was packed with wall-to-wall people. Forget trying to get to food! Nevertheless, the balloon glow was awesome. I've never seen anything like it, and I look forward to going back next year to shoot more pic-tures. This was a very full and fulfilling day. Thanks to the PPC for the opportunity and to Eliza-

beth especially for the hard work she put in. I hope the club will continue with the scavenger hunts—it was a lot of fun! And, oh, by the way, I do like the new lens.

I shot without a tripod to enable quick response time. The photo for the **"colorful"** category was taken when



1/13 at F9; the clown was 1/400 at F5.6.

Afterwards, it was challenging to submit images straight out of the camera, with no retouching and a bit nerve-wracking to quickly choose which image best fit each listed item, as several could apply to each. It was a great day, thanks to Elizabeth, Bob and Reuben. I appreciate their time and effort in administering the contest and media passes and providing such an interesting and enjoyable activity!

I passed an inflating balloon and something caught my eye. I knelt facing the inside of the balloon to see individuals attaching the round "top" of the balloon from the other side.

The image for the **"face**" category was captured as I walked through the vendor area and saw this character begin to "clown" for my camera.

Both were shot with ISO 200 on aperture priority. The balloon image was

Last call for exhibits in Plano public spaces

The PPC's annual exhibits at the Plano Municipal Center and Convention Centre will begin on Nov. 14 with a reception planned for 6-8:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 16 in the Municipal Center Training Room A.

On Jan. 8, half of the art will be moved to the Plano Convention Centre to remain until approximately Feb. 29.

Each member may submit two framed pieces initially. Each print should be at least 8×10 , preferably 11 x 14 or larger, in frames at least 11 x 14, preferably 16 x 20 or larger. Each piece **MUST** have wire on the back of the frame for proper hanging. <u>Pieces without wire will not be displayed.</u>

Subject matter is open with the following exceptions: No nudity or subjects that would be considered in bad taste to the general public. Each image should have a title, the artist's name, email address and/or phone number placed on the back of each piece. A preprinted form will be available to members at the Sept. 18 meeting and on the website.

Coordinators Ed Auger and Jamie Hilbig need volunteers to help hang both events and remove the framed art at the conclusion of the events. <u>Drop-off dates will begin Oct. 18 and</u> <u>run through Oct. 31. Entries can be delivered to</u> <u>Ed Auger at 3008 Dartmouth Drive, Plano</u> 75075 or at the PPC meeting on Oct. 22. Guidelines to enter Prints in October

Please note that in October we will enter only prints for the competition. **Theme: Open**

- Prints must be mounted (with optional mat on top), cannot be framed
- Must be no larger than 16" x 24" and no smaller than 64 square inches

- On the back of a print indicate the top of the image and write your name, class, and entry's title on a pre-printed label provided by the club. Sheets of these labels can be picked up at the contest table at the club's October meeting.

• Prints must be entered before the end of the October meeting by placing prints in the appropriate stack on the Contest table.

Masters Class to offer anonymous e-mail critiques

Beginning in November, members in good standing may submit one image a month electronically for feedback from two to three experienced photographers. This is an opportunity to receive an in-depth critique of a photograph every month that can help you become a better photographer.

E-Critique Process:

1. Submit one JPEG file (PPC contest format; 1024x768 or smaller at 72 dpi) as an e-mail attachment to the critique coordinator, Larry Petterborg at: lpetterborg@tx.rr.com. The file name should not include the maker's identity.

2. Images will be sent electronically by the coordinator to two or three members (depending on availability and willingness) of the Masters Class for constructive comments. Commentators will be expected to make positive suggestions for image improvements and return their comments to the critique coordinator within two weeks. All critiques will be anonymous.

3. The individual critiques will be edited, consolidated, and sent to the maker of the image via e-mail.
