

## Best of Show, Open competition, February 2008

I shot this photo while visiting a friend's brother in law's ranch in New Mexico. I used a Nikon D200 with a VR 18 ~ 200 Nikkor Zoom lens. I used a complex and ancient darkroom technique familiar only to those who have ever used an enlarger and chemicals to make a print: I made the image darker.

Now that we are done with the "who cares" part of the story, let me tell you a truthful and much more interesting one: That is not just a car. That is Hazel the Car. And although she looks like a lady who is comfortable in her golden years, she has a sordid past that includes a traveling salesman's (her first owner) infidelities and, yes, death!

She was bought in 1950, nearly new, as simply another Nash. But she was destined to be an accomplice in her owner's philandering. He proceeded to confirm every story ever told about the members of his profession and all the farmers' daughters that ever crossed their paths. But, alas,

## April speaker captures Heard Museum's annual BOS

PPC member R.E. (Ron) Marabito, whose B&W image "Aspens in Fresh Snow" won Best of Show in the Heard Natural Science Museum 28<sup>th</sup> Annual Photography Contest, will speak on his unique

approach to photography known as "Photo Escapes" at the club's April 28 meeting. Here's his story behind his prize-winning image.

"Every year for the last six, my wife and I have traveled to Moab, Utah, in late April through the middle of May where we meet with an RV Group for a rally and some off-road adventures. Last May 5 we woke up at 7 a.m. to a cold rainy morning. Our potluck breakfast was scheduled for 9:30. When we went outside, it was obvious, looking back at the La Sal Mountains to the southeast, that they had fresh snow. I tried to get others enthused about going up there after breakfast, but no takers, so Shirley and I loaded up our gear and headed into the mountains around noon.

Fresh snow on the ground above 6,000 feet and deeper the higher, we went. I'm sure I took in excess of 100 images. The image that won Best of Show at the Heard was taken along the dirt road going up to Geyser Pass. We were at around 8,000 ft. and in almost 9 inches of fresh snow. No one had been on the road ahead of us, so it was quite pristine. Thank God for 4-wheel drive.



The image was shot in RAW, f20.0, 1/125, ISO 400, hand held. Camera is Canon 5D using Canon EF24-105mm, f4.0 IS-USM lens. Shot at 102mm. The image was slightly underexposed at 1/125, but I did not want to shoot any slower and wanted the depth of field with f20.0. Pushing ISO past 400 would have produced too much noise. I was shooting into the sun veiled by clouds.

All said and done, there was so little color in the image, I decided to convert it to B&W and am glad that I did, as it is more striking that way. This image was very gratifying. It won Image of the Year selected by the membership of the Heard Nature Photographers, First Place in the Richardson Annual Photo Contest and First Place and Best of Show in the Heard Contest."





### DAVID WILLE



Hi gang -

David Wille and I were very fortunate in shooting Horsetail Falls recently in Yosemite. This falls drains only 40 acres on the top of El Capitan, usually flows only 3-4 weeks in early spring, and the last two weeks of February the setting sun lights it up perfectly. Getting a good shot of Horsetail Falls can be elusive, since there must be enough snow fall on top of El Capitan to provide water for the falls; the temperatures must be warm enough to melt



the snow (if any), and the skies must be clear at sunset for the light to hit it. Also it helps to have a little breeze blowing up the face of El Capitan to create some mist, since the falls is so small otherwise. Some photographers have tried to shoot Horsetail Falls for years without success. We had three nights in a row of good sunset light. Each successive evening, since we had warm temperatures each day, more water was flowing over the falls than the previous day. David and I decided the 3rd week of February would have been better to get the red light on the falls, because by the time the red light came at sunset last week, the light was off the falls. So I have to go back and try again!!

"I have only been to Yosemite this one time but after seeing it in Winter, I can honestly say I'd rather shoot it in Winter than Summer. The troubling part is that it is spectacularly beautiful after a snowfall, but I understand that only happens 3-5 times a year in the valley on average and the snow normally melts off the rocks and trees by noon. We were fortunate to be in the park for a snowstorm and got some nice winter scene images as well."
