


Who needs models when you can shoot a train three times?

Warning! These techniques are addictive. I photographed the wheels and drive mechanism on "Engine 19" during the PPC October Model Shoot at the Frisco Heritage Museum and it won Best of Show at the November meeting.

The striking detail comes about through



the application of three different processes – digital IR camera capture, HDR (high dynamic range) processing, and tonal contrast filtering. I have been practicing with these three separately, and they came together in this photograph.

The camera is a Nikon D2X modified by LDP LLC (maxmax.com) for IR only photography. The lens is the Nikon 18-200 DX which works very well with IR wave lengths. Cameras modified for IR have the IR blocking filter and the Moiré filter (also called the "blur" filter) removed; this allows extremely good detail at the sensor. I was on the shady side of the train and had to position the camera to minimize light flowing through the many openings. I exposed three images at f/5.6 and shutter speeds of 0.6, 1/15, and 1/50 second. This resulted in a Goldilocks set – too bright, too dark, and just right. (Note that shooting with an IR camera is hit or miss. The camera's auto exposure gets you in the ball park and then you have to go up or down a couple of stops. I don't know how this was done with film.)

The three exposures were combined into an HDR image with *Photomatix* (hdrsoft.com). The *Details Enhancer* feature in the *Tone Mapping* tool enhanced both shadows and highlights. I was pretty heavy handed with the adjustments to really push the details.

In *Photoshop CS3* (Adobe.com), the image was converted to black and white (the native IR image is almost black and white after custom white balancing, but has a tint) and curves and levels were applied. The final detail enhancing step was to apply the *Tonal Contrast* filter from the Photoshop plugin *Color Efex Pro 3.0 Complete Edition* (niksoftware.com). This is a lovely filter. Again, I was heavy handed to really pump up the detail, particularly in the shadows.

This type of image is not for everyone or every situation. I encourage you to experiment with HDR and extreme local contrast to see how it fits your style. Joyful shooting!




