If you plan to submit framed photographs to the 2009 PPC Showcase we need the titles and your contact information by Aug. 10 so we can develop a catalog. Contact information should include your name and telephone number and/or email address. Please send this information to: exhibits@planophotographyclub.com

Reminder: Photographs to be exhibited should be at least 8"x10" framed to 11"x14" (photographs 11"x14" framed to 16"x 20" would be even better). The maximum acceptable framed size is 24"x36". Maximum number of images per club member is two.

Showcase photographs will be hung at the Plano Municipal Center (City Hall 1520 Avenue K, just north of 15th street) on Tuesday, Sept. 1, and remain there until Monday, Oct. 26. Judges will select first, second and third place winners and any deserving honorable mention ribbons. There will be a reception on Friday, Oct. 23, to recognize all ribbon winners and also to show all photographs that were submitted. The Plano Photography Club has many talented members and they all deserve recognition.

On Monday, Oct. 26, approximately half of the photographs will be moved to the Plano Centre (the Convention Center) at Spring Creek Parkway and Jupiter Road. Wall space limitations require this reduction. Photographs will stay there until Tuesday, Jan. 5, and then be taken down.

Well, spring came and my bluebonnets started blooming and it was only a few days until I was to

leave to go on my annual bluebonnet trip with my mother. I got the boots and spurs out of the bag and found that they were in worse shape than I thought. The leather of the spurs was so stiff that I used some saddle soap to try



to soften them so that I could attach them to the boots. I took some shots and wished that I had time to take more, but it was time to go. We traveled back to Comstock to return the boots. My Aunt's sister-in-law said, "Bill didn't even know the boots and spurs were missing".

To take the picture, I used the natural light that comes in from the North window of my home. I had my camera on a tripod. I use a Canon Rebel and shoot in camera RAW. The exposure time was 4 seconds, the F-stop-f/20, ISO speed 100, focal length 79 mm. The picture didn't quite have the look that I wanted. I applied the poster edges to it in Photoshop CS4.

Our program on July 27 will be by Tom Hicks and friends representing the Pug Mark Park. This is in


conjunction with an opportunity for members to photograph the beautiful tigers and lion in McKinney in September. Please attend to learn more about this remarkable effort and photo opportunity.

Lenses between 28mm and 300mm should be a practical range during the trip, and a few bottles of water would be a very good idea.



"They — Time/Life — paid me to pursue my hobby"

This is another in a series of articles designed dicted me to photography when, at age 8 or so, to introduce PPC members to one another. The interviewer is Bill J Boyd.

Give us some background information, i.e, name, how long have you lived in Texas, and anything else that you think your fellow club members would like to know about you.

My name is Jose Artiles. In 1961 I requested political asylum when I moved, suddenly and unexpectedly, from Havana to Miami after the failure of the Bay of Pigs Invasion. However, my relatives and close friends are convinced the real reason I came to the U.S. was because I was kicked out of the country for being the only Cuban who doesn't like or know how to dance. After a few months I relocated to NYC where I got a job as a photo lab tech with Time Inc., publishers of Time, Life, Sports Illustrated, People and quite a few more magazines. After 35 years, they finally got wise to the fact they had been paying me to have fun instead of working, so I beat them to the punch and retired in 1996. My wife had been living in the house we built in Frisco back in 1993 so, rather than continue to commute from NYC on a weekly basis, as I had been doing prior to my retirement, and much to her chagrin, I moved in with her. Soon thereafter, I joined PPC. However, Mary Ann is not too happy about it. It gets me out of the house only once a month...

How long have you been a member of Plano Photography Club (PPC)? Are you a member of any other photo organizations and/or clubs?

I joined the Visual Arts Guild of Frisco several years ago but I am not an active member. In fact, Mary Ann has made several snide remarks about me and cobwebs. But, hey, I'm doing what I am very good at doing: Nothing!

Tell us something about your very first camera and how you got interested in photography.

My grandmother is to be blamed for having ad-

she bought me my first camera. It was an Imperial Six-Twenty Snap Shot Camera (big name for something small and cheap). I eventually gradu-

ated to the upscale Brownie HawkEye, Flash Model, no less! I began to take photography more seriously, though, when I discovered Life magazine in the early 50's. Little did I suspect that. eventually, they would pay me to pursue my hobby.



What is in your camera bag? Describe the oddest item in your bag (if any).

When I was using film, I used to take with me 3 Nikons: two N8oo8's with motor drives and an F100, each with a different focal length lens. However, after I went digital, I usually take with me only two Nikon D200's. One with a 12 ~ 24 Nikkor zoom, and the other one with an 18 ~ 200 Nikkor zoom. Sometimes, though seldom, I take my Nikon D70 (it was my first digital camera) with a Nikkor 500mm mirror lens or just as a spare body. I recently bought a Nikon D700, which, for now, I am using with a 28 ~ 70 Nikkor zoom. As to the oddest piece of equipment: I used to have (it was stolen in NYC years ago) a Russian Horizon 35mm panoramic camera. It took 140° photos. Each frame was the length of three 35mm standard frames, so it would only take 12 shots on a roll of 35mm film. It had a 50mm lens that pivoted on its axis. There was a vertical slit on the front of it that acted as the shutter curtain. The film sat on a concave cloth back. When the shutter was pressed, the lens swiveled, thus "painting" the image on to the film. This camera looked like a black metal brick, and there was lit-

tle to indicate what it really was. Amazingly, it had photo shoots with a very sharp lens. I eventually replaced it with a modern Horizon that actually looks like a camera, but the pictures are only 120°. I still have it, but I don't use it any more.

Describe your photography interests, i.e., what do you like to shoot, how often do you shoot, etc.

I am very picky as to what I shoot. I only like to photograph two different subjects: Those which are alive and those which are not. I can go for days without shooting anything, though, but when go... I do, I shoot a lot because it's cheaper than film. Besides, I figure that the law of averages is in my favor: the more I shoot, the more likely I am to come up with something worth looking at. However, I do spend my whole day, from about 9 a.m. till about 11:30 p.m. with appropriate breaks (some of which are more frequent at my age), in front of my Mac processing my RAW images with Pshop CS3. I have CS4 but I haven't installed it.

What lens to you use most often? Before I bought the D700 (which is

a full frame camera), the 18 ~ 200 was the lens I would use most frequently. That lens on the D200 has a factor of X1.5 which is the equivalent of a 27 - 300 on a full frame. But, now, I have a feeling it's going to be the 28 ~ 70 until I can find something equivalent for the D700. Although I have a feeling it would be so expensive that I I rarely make any plans to photograph anything in would have to win the lottery or sell my first-born child in order to buy it. However, since my kid is 45 years old, I don't think I'll get much for him, so the lottery is looking like a valid option...
