

ISO 1600! Blame it on Marfa lights

It was a pleasant and humbling surprise to learn that my photo had received best of show for February after my son, Paul, had the same honor the previous month.

"Desert Bloom" was taken in April 2007 at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Center and Botanical Gardens south of Fort Davis on one of our trips to the Big Bend area.



Since the February competition judge commented on the sharpness of the photograph, I was interested to look back at the metadata to see what it would reveal. The camera used was a Canon Rebel XT with a 17 to 85 mm IS kit lens set at 85 mm. There was no

flash and no tripod, so I guess image stabilization helped. I noticed that the shutter speed was 1/500th/sec and the lens opening was f13. So, I reasoned that these settings contributed to sharpness.

Then I checked the ISO. It was 1600! What? (I usually have it set at or about 200.) The mystery was solved when I looked at the series of photos and discovered that two nights earlier we had tried to capture the Marfa lights with ISO 1600 and I apparently forgot to reset the camera. Guess it did not degrade the image too much.

My son said, "Sometimes it is better to be lucky than good!"

Thanks again to the club for the opportunities to learn and have fun.

PPCer hits Texas Monthly cover with balloons in mist

I have loved hot air balloons since I first saw photos of the Albuquerque Balloon Festival some 40 years ago. How convenient when I moved to Plano in 1984; they had a Balloon Festival! I loved getting up in the dark to run over to Bob Woodruff park and see the balloons go aloft in the dawn light.

Fast forward to 2009, the 30th annual Plano Balloon Festival. Getting up for the dawn launch has lost some of its appeal. It was Sunday, Sept. 20, the last day of the festival. My husband and I woke up around 5 a.m. when I realized "oh, if I want to see the balloons at dawn we have to get up

NOW". We got moving and grabbed our camera gear. I had my prized Canon Rebel XSi that my husband gave me for a Christmas present just nine months prior, with a 75-300mm zoom lens as well as an 18-55mm.

We waited patiently with the hundreds of other spectators and photographers as crews tried numerous times to get three balloons to "glow" simultaneously for the traditional photo op. I got a few of those shots and thought I had a cool photo of a glowing balloon with the morning star in the distance.

I kept the zoom lens on, as most of the shots were in the distance. Then the balloonists started to arrive in quantity and began laying out the fabric, firing up the burners and beginning to ascend for the mass liftoff.

I snapped photos in rapid succession, always looking for a different angle or composition. I was standing near the curb behind families sprawled on the grass with their little ones, just as I had done with my own kids some years back. This time I kept standing in photo position. As the balloons went aloft, a swirl of color and activity passed through my viewfinder. Each shot was a split-second slice of time that couldn't be repeated. I continued shooting with only a few settings changes. Although I had had a good, old film SLR 30 years ago and learned



the subtleties of setting the f-stop and shutter speed for the best capture, I was now mostly using my DSLR in the "P" (Program) mode. The ISO setting was maxed out at 1600.

When I got home and downloaded the images, two stood out – the one of the balloon glowing with the morning star and another, one of those split-second slices of time with multiple balloons in near and far range and in various stages of going aloft. In the middle of that photo sequence, one seemed to have the most interesting composition in the frame and some stand-out color. Looking more at the photo, it seemed to tell a story...so much action!.

At the time I was enjoying uploading photos in online "competitions" on RedBubble.com. I entered the morning star photo and the one of balloons going up. Got hardly any response on the morning star photo but many positive responses on the other one!.

A few months later, I joined the Plano

Photography Club in hopes of getting some live, in-person critiques and connections to help me build my skills. Soon I joined an Austin-based photography interest group calling for photo submissions for an upcoming gallery show in Austin. "OK", I thought, "I'll send the two photos that have gotten the strongest response on RedBubble" – one black b/w of two gentlemen I had shot on vacation in Italy...and the photo I titled "Balloons in the Mist".

Several weeks later I got n e-mail saying that my two photos had been selected for the gallery showing and I needed to get some matted prints to them in Austin in less than a week! I e-mailed some PPC members for quick advice and got the prints matted and shipped off to Austin.

The Alpha and Omega Gallery show opening was Feb. 20. I could not miss this event! The show was packed, and I enjoyed watching how people responded to the "Balloons in the Mist" print hanging with many other outstanding prints.

A few weeks later I was in a waiting room and perused a copy of *Texas Monthly* magazine. What luck! *Texas Monthly* was running a theme of the "Bucket List" (as in "kick the bucket") things to do in Texas. They were sponsoring a cover contest, asking for submissions of photos fitting the theme. That is how "Balloons in the Mist" made its way to become the Grand Prize winner of the *Texas Monthly* cover contest!

I am a Texas native and proud flagwaving fan of our state. There is a great deal of pride for me in participating in a contest that celebrates the beauty and unique qualities of Texas. It all started with a love of hot air balloons, a life-long love of photography and... a love of Texas!

May 1 instructional workshop to prepare 12 for model shoot

A free instructional workshop limited to 12 participants is scheduled for 11 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, May 1, primarily to train inexperienced portrait photographers who have signed up for the club's annual Spring Indoor Model Shoot two weeks later on Saturday, May 15.

The workshop will be at the home of PPC members John and Lois Lehman, 2727 Gainesborough Drive, Dallas, phone (972) 307-8027 or (972) 437-4599. For more information or to register for the workshop, contact www.windsweptphoto.com. The Lehmans and PPC member Russell McGuire will lead the workshop.

Dr. Lehman said the workshop, with a model, will emphasize lighting, posing and etiquette. Weather permitting, limited shooting is planned indoors and out. The three leaders will check participants' cameras, lenses and other equipment and recommend those best for use at the model shoot.

The Spring Indoor Model Shoot itself will be held on the second floor of the Education Building at Grace Presbyterian Church on Saturday, May 15, 10 a.m.-3 p.m. The membersonly event is limited to 36 attendees. The \$30 entry fee will cover costs of eight professional models booked from two local agencies -- Core Talent Agency and Dawn Rochelle Agency. Light snacks and refreshments will be provided.

We need members to provide six additional strobe light sets. If you can offer lights for this shoot, please contact Don Spector at <u>Mailto:robdonspector@yahoo.com</u>. If we are not able to fill our lighting needs from within the club, we will scale back the number of models.

There will be no requirement to provide images to the models as part of their compensation package, but if you wish to provide your five best images of each model, burn them on a single CD and give it to me to mail a consolidated CD to each model.
