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
#### BEST IN SHOW: ASSURED CONTAINMENT- BY ALAN MANN

I do volunteer work with the Bill Glass Champions for Life "Behind the Walls" prison ministry and serve as the event photographer for that organization. As such, I'm approved for photography in various Texas prison units as well as those in some other states. This photo was taken inside the Mark Stiles Unit (state prison) at Beaumont, TX during an event early last December.

As our group was preparing to leave the unit, the exterior fence with its seemingly endless coils of razor wire, the lines and the texture, caught my eye. The glisten of the late afternoon sun reflecting on the wire added a special touch. Of additional interest is the stark contrast with the beautiful blue sky and the lone pigeon perched atop the razor wire near the center of the picture, both of which suggest freedom. This foreboding scene – the fence and the rusting "old school" guard tower (staffed with armed guards of course) – contrasted with freedom on the outside, inspired the title of "Assured Containment."

I shot this with a Nikon D300, ISO 400, 1/250 sec., f/8, at .67 EV with a Nikkor 16-85mm f/3.5-5.6G ED VR AF-S zoom lens at about 50mm. I love my Nikon equipment and enjoy all types of photography, but probably like "people photography" the best ... especially where I can capture emotions and tell a story. As such, most of my shooting tends to be event photography on a volunteer basis for several organizations. I enjoy continually learning more about the craft as well as experimenting with different techniques and gadgets.

#### GUEST SPEAKER — WINTER AND SUMMER IN TANZANIA — ELEANORE AVERY-FERG

Eleanore will share photographs from winter in southern Tanzania (Selous and Ruaha parks) and summer in the south of the Serengeti where Wildebeest and Zebras gather for a huge birthing event before migrating north. Eleanore has won hundreds of awards in local, national, and international photographic competitions. She has traveled the world and has taken photographs in 65 countries. She is an active member of the Dallas Camera Club and the Photographic Society of America (PSA). She is the PSA Region 24 Director and President of the Gulf States Camera Clubs Council (GSCCC). Among her recent recognitions was a photo on exhibit at the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C., in the "Nature's Best Photography Highly Honored" exhibit which opened April 2011.

#### **CHANGES TO CLUB COMPETITION PROCESS**

The board has made a number of changes to the competition process effective with the May 2012 competition. We are adding a new competition level, Intermediate, between Beginners and Advanced. When a member registers at the competition web site, the member may select to join at either the Beginners or Intermediate level. The contest manager, any board member or Masters class member can give advice on selecting a level. Experienced photographers may petition the board to join at the Advanced class.

In April of this year, the Board will divide the current Beginner and Advanced competition groups into the three groups. The goal is to have three roughly equally sized groups where each group reflects those who are at about the same skill level in camera craft and scoring. Thereafter, at the end of each contest year the Board will consider promotions based on balancing the size of all levels, except for Masters, Typically, a member will progress to higher levels as photographic skills, contest experience, and success increase. A member will not be automatically moved to a lower level if their performance is down during a year. However, there may be occasions when the Board will give a member the opportunity to voluntarily move down if the member would be more comfortable competing at a lower level. All changes of levels occur at the beginning of the contest year. Promotion to Masters remains the same, by invitation of the board.

Beginner: Minimally experienced photographer. Has either not competed in Club contests or is having minimal success. Intermediate: More experience with photography fundamentals and has had competition experience and success. Advanced: Earned through competition experience and results. Approved by the Board.

Master: Earned through competition experience and results and service to the Club. Approved by the Board.

The board is also making changes to the judging guidelines. Previously, images were awarded 2 to 5 points in three categories: interest, composition, and technique. Beginning with the May 2012 contest, images will be awarded 6 to 15 points at the judge's discretion. This more accurately reflects how judges actually score images. Starting with the May contest the guidelines that will be given to judges include:

Minimum score 6: The effort of submitting merits a score of no less than 6.

7-9 represents a "fair" entry

10-12 represents a "good" entry

13-15 represents an "excellent" entry. For themed competitions, an "excellent" score may not be given to an image that does not fit the theme.

We don't force distributions. In other words the 1st place image doesn't have to receive 15 points, 2nd place 14 points. etc. Likewise, there may be multiple high scores. We want the images to be scored against the criteria, not each other. An image that scores 8 in the Master's category would also score an 8 in the Beginner's category.

In a monthly competition with a fixed subject assignment, the judge's scoring should reflect in part how well the assigned subject contributed to the overall image. Previously, a judge could disqualify an image. Now, the judge may simply deduct points if the image does not reflect the assigned subject.

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: WHAT'S WITH ALL THESE CHANGES?

The article earlier in this issue outlines some changes the Board is making to the competitions and you may be wondering, "Why these changes and why now?"

The Competition Groups are changing in order to increase the educational value of the competition, which is the primary goal of the monthly competition. By receiving feedback from judges, we have a better idea of how to improve and, by receiving scores, we can see if we are improving. First, we have received input that some members are reluctant to submit images because they feel their images are not good enough compared to images submitted by others. So, we wanted to make the Beginner Group truly for those just getting started and at the same time, give those with more developed skills a place to compete without reaching the Advanced Group. Second, when analyzing last year's scores, it was apparent that the average and distribution of scores in the Beginner and Advanced Groups are about the same. That indicated that a method better than self-selection is needed when members are deciding which group to join. So we added Board oversight. No system is perfect, but for us at this time, the changes are appropriate.

The scoring Instructions we give the judges is changing to reflect how a judge really works and because judges find it awkward to score in the three categories we gave - technical, composition, and interest. We had been trying to reduce scoring to an algorithm and judging just is not objective – it is about how an image "speaks" to the judge. Feedback from judges is that they look through the images and sort them according to overall impact and interest and put them in natural groupings. They then assign scores within a range to the different groupings. We researched photo club rules, as well as instructions given by the Gulf States Camera Club Councils (GSCCC) to judges, and based the new model on what we saw. The challenge for the Contest Chairman is to work with the judges to give actionable input during the commentary.

I feel certain we can count on you to work with us as we make these changes.
