BEST IN SHOW: TRAFFIC ACCIDENT, BROADWAY-BY JOSE ARTILES

There really isn't much to tell about this shot. It was simply a case of being in the right place with a camera. I came across it while walking in the rain on Broadway and 45th St. It was a one car accident caused by moving too fast, hitting the breaks and skidding in the rain. Thankfully, no one was hurt. Being that it was in NYC, most people didn't much care, mainly because it didn't block traffic!

I shot it with a handheld Nikon D200 and an $18 \sim 200 \text{ f}/3.5-5.6 \text{ Nikkor zoom}$. Exposure was 1/30th at f/5.3 ISO 400 RAW. The image was color corrected and cropped.

Holiday Party and Christmas Lights Shoot

Our Annual Holiday Party is Saturday, December 1, in our regular meeting room. Setup is 5:30 PM with dinner at 6. Please bring an appetizer, vegetable or dessert as well as a short slideshow on a Flash drive or CD. Sign up at the November meeting. The club will provide meat, drinks and utensils.

After the traditional slideshows presented by members, James Stover will do a short presentation on using the HDR technique to shoot Christmas lights. We will then drive to the Deerfield neighborhood north of Legacy between Ohio and Archgate and park near the entrance at Legacy and Archgate. From there we will walk into the neighborhood to view the lights and take pictures. Bring your tripod, camera, walking shoes and, if the weather is cool, a warm jacket. The neighborhood is known for its decorations and is a traditional Christmas destination.













Tips for Scenes with Extremes in Lighting

The difference between the darkest and lightest areas of a scene is the dynamic range. At night our eyes can perceive a dynamic range 600 times that of our daytime vision. Because a camera can detect a much smaller range than our eyes, the photos we take cannot match what we see with our eyes. However, there are techniques we can use to approximate what we see.

Bright overhead sun creates deep shadows whether of objects or people. Although it seems counter-intuitive, this situation benefits from the use of a flash to eliminate harsh shadows and open up faces and shaded areas as long as they are within 10' - 15' of the flash.

Brightly lit scenes reflect light from every surface. (Black will photograph as gray because of the reflection of light.) A polarizer reduces those reflections. Consider using a polarizer any time you are in sunlight, not just to enhance a blue sky.

To adjust over-exposed skies or a highly reflective surface such as water, use a graduated Neutral Density (ND) filter. Neutral density filters reduce the amount of light coming into the camera lens without affecting color. A graduated ND filter gradually decreases the density across the filter until it is clear. The darker portion is placed over the brightest part of the scene resulting in more even exposure of the scene.

Another way to capture the full range of light in a scene is High Dynamic Range (HDR), a technique combining 2 or more exposures of the same scene. It was first used in 1850 by Gustave Le Grey who used two negatives to produce one positive. You can replicate this by taking two exposures (one for the scene and one for the sky) and layering the correctly exposed sky over the scene. You can get free software, such as SNS-HDR, or purchase software to digitally combine several images taken at different exposures to produce an image correctly exposed throughout. Photoshop and other image editors include HDR features.

Last weekend I was in beautiful Zion National Park in the company of fellow photographers trying to capture the changing moods of the canyon. We experienced a crisp sunny fall day, drizzly cloudy skies, a dusting of snow, and below freezing temperatures all in a 4-day workshop. I can now appreciate the persistence it takes to get just one excellent shot.

The workshop leader left me with two questions that need to be foremost every time I lift my camera to my eye." What is my subject?" It can be a person, thing, mood, lighting, or concept. "How can I compose the shot to bring attention to my subject?" Think of light and dark, focus, leading lines, or other components of composition. Only then do you concentrate on the technicalities of exposure and focus. Although I was not consistent in this exercise, it is something I think will greatly improve my photography, and yours, as well.
