Best in Show: Watercolors - By James Walsh

New England in the fall is a great place for a photographer. My wife and I ended up in New London, New Hampshire at an old inn located on the edge of Pleasant Lake. I got up before dawn for sunrise shots and on two mornings, a perfect low fog rolled in over Pleasant Lake, offering an entirely different and welcome set of opportunities.

The boat was anchored close to the the edge with great color in the background. The trees were close enough to the edge to be reflected nicely in the water. The fog was low on the water surrounding the boat and just the right thickness in the background so as to not block the color of the nearby trees, but to be prominent in the mix with the trees in the far background. The scene offered a good layering effect.

I took six exposures with a Nikon D810 using a 24-70mm lens. This one was 0.4 seconds at f11 with ISO 100. The main challenge of post-processing in Lightroom was to get the fog to look as good in the image as it did in reality. I played around guite a bit with highlights, white clipping and reduced clarity to get the right effect. Some relatively minor adjustments to vibrance helped bring out the color in the trees. One of the buoys was cloned out to leave the more appealing number of three. All of the pieces seemed to fall into place.

Three other pictures taken on this trip that I entered in contests did well. I highly recommend both the scenery of New Hampshire and being in the right place at the right time.

Guest Speaker - Visual Voice - Graham Hobart

Graham Hobart has been a professional photographer for over thirty years. He was born in a British colony in Africa and lived in London before moving to Texas 17 years ago. Graham's commercial work has been featured in books and magazines from the USA to the Russian Federation, making the cover photo on Nikon's flagship publication Nikon World. Graham's wildlife photography was exhibited at the National Geographic gallery in London in 2012-2013, and on the "Wall of Fame" at Nikon's Imaging USA exposition in Atlanta, GA. He also travels on a regular basis to lecture and show his work for photography sponsors which include Canson Papers, the Booth Museum in Atlanta, and Nikon USA. Most recently, Graham contracted with a the Cultural Heritage Art Gallery in Arusha, Tanzania (near Mt Kilimanjaro) to have a number of large pieces of work permanent exhibit. Graham is currently commissioned by the Booth Museum to photograph the American West and contribute an infrared image to their permanent collection.

Before showing some of his infrared wildlife work, which also includes a short film, Graham Hobart will take you on a brief visual journey through his early images and show the path that led to where he is today. He will also discuss his thoughts and ideas that will help you develop an individual style. This will enable you to not only stand out and be noticed but more importantly be heard as you develop your own visual voice. This is a much needed topic that comes at a time when mediocre, generic copycat images are all too often the norm.

This lecture is for all ages and levels of expertise. Graham believes that too often we are asking our cameras to merely record what is in front of us in the hopes that it will accurately represent the physical subject matter. Instead we should be asking ourselves how we feel about what is in front of us and what is the truest way to express that feeling (with the camera) so that it will bring meaning to the end viewer. This is not just for fine art photographers but commercial photographers as well because we are increasingly moving into a marketplace of services instead of manufactured products. Graham Hobart believes that, although we live in a over stimulated world of imagery, there is still room for well crafted images that speak directly to the hearts and minds of a cynical public.

the task is daunting but think of the alternative where photography is no more valuable than a photo-copy and artistic expression has moved into other media because modern photography has lost all credibility. Let us all begin our personal search for our own Visual Voice.



Acting President's Message: Seeing Differently

Not too long ago, I was talking with several of our Masters photographers. Since many of them have been with the club for years and have demonstrated polished photographic skills, I was quite surprised to hear one of them say she was occasionally challenged in framing the subject, capturing too much of it, and so not getting a good image. I've experienced the same problem so often that I've labeled it, "documenting"... as in the purpose of the photograph was to "document" something's presence. For me, this means getting the entire object in the frame, which frequently results in a rather blah photograph.

But truly seeing must be harder than it sounds, for many have remarked on it. Our January contest judge,

Amy Holmes George, said in her introductory comments that we should try to "see beyond what a thing actually is". Our June 2014 speaker, Leonard Volk, writes in his book, *everyday*: "...we are desensitized by familiarity. We think we have seen it all before and need not pay attention." Larry Lourcey, our April Speaker, told us to look at a painting for 15 minutes, giving us time to get beyond our normal filters of how we perceive things.

Maybe seeing differently might help us avoid merely "documenting" something's presence, and bring more insight into our photography. Maybe it's where the magic happens...
