# Best In Show: I Know It's Cold. It's All Right By Ron Hasty

This image was taken on a ranch in Northern Wyoming on a very cold, overcast January 2017 morning shortly after sunrise. It had snowed 18" the day before. The wrangler, a really fine horsewoman, was working with a string of horses being moved to a new pasture. With the shutter speed set at 1/320 as the horse started crossing the stream I shot at 10 fps hoping to capture a frame which would convey motion with the horse's hoofs splashing the water.

I was drawn to the emotional connection between the wrangler and the horse as she patted it's neck and talked to it while heading toward the stream. The adjacent colors of the yellow gloves and poncho and the green coat harmonize with the accent of the white snow to help to create a serene picture. The gloves and the poncho also make a nice triangle which helps hold the viewer's eye. The composition was completed by the reflection in the stream and the curve of the stream framing the subject. Details: Nikon D500, Nikkor 28-300 at 72 mm, 1/320, f 5.6, +1EV because the image was about 1/2 filled with snow, Auto ISO 1000, uncropped composition, basic post processing of the raw file in Adobe Lightroom.

# **Photographing "On The Road"**

Our March 2018 Competition Topic is "On The Road", so here is another in my series on ideas for creating winning competition images. Photography is a great way to document your travels; you can record your experiences, impressions, and moods. Later it is great fun to share these experiences and observations through slideshows and photo books. Plus, you create material for our monthly competitions.

#### Byline: You as Reporter

Remember that you should be *reporting* your trip, not just *recording* it. Too often we hear judges criticize an image as "just a *record shot*." Your images must be more than a record of the locations you visited. The subject of our photographs must be intriguing, sparking appreciation of great beauty or sadness at the impact of natural and human destruction, for example. Tell a story and inspire the viewer to want to know more.

#### Lighting Designer: Let There Be (Effective) Light(ing)

Photography is all about managing light, so we need to capture the light at its best, which usually occurs during the golden hours around sunrise and sunset. As a general rule, avoid the harsh noonday sun, but be mindful that occasionally rules are made to be broken. Don't forget nighttime. Some of the most dramatic images are taken at night using the otherworldly glow of light from stars, auroras, or the Milky Way, or the artificial illumination of a tangled piece of old neon drawing attention to a seedy 1950s motel. For great photographic lighting, timing is everything.

#### Author: You as Storyteller

Use the camera to tell a story, whether it is soldiers on the march, locals going about daily life, animals migrating, religious observances, or world events unfolding before us (remember the Hurricane Harvey picture of the rescuer carrying a young mother and sleeping baby through thigh-high water). Recreate the travels taken by legendary writers such as Jack Kerouac orTom Wolfe, historic travelers like Lewis and Clark, or relatives such as your father's route through World War II. Even a song like *Route 66, Come Fly with Me* or *California Dreamin'* can inspire ideas. Context is all important. A dusty road may be a trite picture, but add a historic sign, an old building, a wayward animal, a quinceañera beauty, or a weather-worn cowboy, and you have a greater chance of creating a worthy image.

#### Scenic Designer: Seeing as well as Looking

Make your imges come alive through depth and texture; make the viewer "see" what you saw when you captured the image. Find an exotic object or location and snap an unusual angle or perspective (remember the recent picture of Dak Prescott with legs straight up in the air vaulting over the goal line for a touchdown). Consider the lighting. You do not have to travel far. Texas is blessed with public and private buildings and architecture (both historic and modern), theaters, abandoned railroads, museums, places of worship, lighthouses, farm equipment, junk yards, ghost towns, eccentric outdoor art, gas stations, diners, dance halls, statues and monuments, schools, sports events, and cemeteries. Perhaps add a whole cast of beautiful and eccentric characters to populate the scene.

#### **Composition: You as the Director**

Finally, observe the basic rules of composition. Use walls, roads, fences, railroad lines, paths, hedges to create leading lines, diagonals and S curves. Use the rule of thirds to position important elements and look for elements to frame an image. And always, always have fun.

# Guest Speakers - "Patagonia And Pumas" - Larry Petterborg

As many of you know, I grew up in Utah and have spent a great of time in the mountains of the Western US. In all of that time, I was never been lucky enough to see a wild Mountain Lion in it's natural habitat. But that all changed this spring. In April, I traveled to Patagonia with Jeff Parker (<a href="http://exploreinfocus.com/">http://exploreinfocus.com/</a>) specifically to photograph wild Pumas (as they are called in South America) just outside of Torres del Paine Nat. Park in Chile. We had access to hundreds of acres of private land and with the help of skilled trackers, we saw cats every day. The lions, while wild, had little fear of us humans and were quite tolerant of our presence. Each day we went out scouting the landscape for cats and once we found them we worked our way in close enough to get good shots but not so close to unduly bother the animals and just stayed with them for several hours. It was a truly remarkable experience and I do hope you will enjoy seeing the image and hearing about my trip to photograph the Pumas of Patagonia.


